

Slide 1: Contemporary image of the Last Supper



Parent Notes

Ask your child to tell you what is happening in the picture. We call it the Last Supper because it was the last time Jesus ate with his friends before He died on the cross. Explore with each other why this was such an important event to Jesus and his disciples.

Tip: Do not settle for the first or <u>expected</u> answer – some version of "He wanted to give them His Body and Blood." Explore with them other dimensions of the event (see below).

- Jesus made sure every one of them were present (even Judas), because unity makes us stronger (He was telling and showing them, "We are in this together").
- Jesus wanted his friends to know how much he loved them.
- Jesus He wanted to tell them to love each other.
- Jesus wanted to show them how important service was as a way to love (washing of the feet)
- Understanding the power of being together Jesus asked them to gather regularly to pray together and share a meal, He returned to the Father.
 - You can use our present experience to talk about how important being with others is and how much you all miss being able to be with family and friends. Presence is a powerful gift to give and receive.
- Jesus wanted them to know that love was more powerful than anything even suffering and death. In giving them his Body and Blood he was promising that he would be with them always and that life would continue after his death, their deaths.

Parent Notes

- Jesus did not intend what we call the Last Supper to be the last time his disciples gathered to be with one another – when we celebrate the Eucharist we are also participating in the Lord's Supper. This is why we also call the Last Supper, the <u>First</u> Communion.
- Christ **invites us to sit at His table**. He asks us to gather with his disciples living now, to receive the gift of His Body and Blood – ('Do this in memory of me'). Church teaching about regular attendance at Mass only echoes what Jesus told his disciples to do at the Last Supper.
- Why is it important to celebrate the Eucharist every week? (For the same reasons Jesus wanted the disciples to be at the Last Supper)
 - → To experience the power of presence and the strength that comes from unity
 - → To know how much Jesus loves us and is always with us (the real presence)
 - → To remind us again that He [Christ] and we [his disciples] are in this together and no matter what happens love will see us through.
 - → To remind us to love each other and be of service receiving the Eucharist expands our capacity to love others and become more like Christ.
 - 💢 Again, make use our current experience as an example. We can Zoom, Skype, call others, use Duo, Hangouts, Instagram, Facebook, wave at people from our cars or from 6 feet away, and play games with our friends on the computer this way, but it is not the same as **being** together. It is true we can pray anytime, anywhere...but it is not the same as celebrating the Eucharist with our faith community.

- **COMMUNION** is not an object it is an <u>experience</u>. The experience of communion, unity, deeper bonds of affection with the Lord and each other, is what the Eucharist <u>effects</u>.
- Communion is not automatic. We all have to do our part in forming and sustaining the experience of communion we share.

Relationships are fluid. Think about family members and friends you use to see regularly, but now do not. Without regular, on-going interaction, some of those relationships will fade. Others, where the bonds formed were powerful and long lasting, remain part of our lives. When we re-connect, we might say, "We didn't miss a beat, we picked up right where we left off." Even this is a recognition that the relationship, while still strong, experienced a hiatus of sorts. It was not diminished by time and distance; neither did it grow. Regular, personal interaction is what allows us to grow in our relationships. This is why we have access to the Eucharist so frequently. Kids know this instinctively. Below are a few kid friendly examples if they are struggling with the concept.

Examples: Anyone can show up to your soccer game but that does not make them a member of the team. Anyone can sign-up to be a member of your dance class, but if they never come to the class or rehearsals, do they dance in the recital/show?

Holy Communion is both a gift we receive (receive the Body/Blood of Christ) and a gift we give to others (We become the Body of Christ in the world). It would be impossible to become a community, a member of the Body of Christ, without being together, being present to each other, sharing with each other, serving each other, supporting and encouraging each other.



It is time to take a break! Thank everyone for spending this time together as a family and for their sharing. If someone said or did something that was especially kind, thoughtful, made you think, or helped you understand something, thank that person by name.

Slide 3: Why Be Baptized?

Every human being is part of God's family. God is Father
to all, no matter when or where
one is born.

This is why everyone deserves to be treated with respect.

God loves each of his sons and daughters unconditionally.

No matter what one thinks, feels, says or does, **or** does not think, feel, say or do, can ever change the way God loves them.



Being Baptized makes us a follower of Jesus, a member of the Body of Christ (the Church).

Things you will need during this part of the session: Photos and mementos of your child's baptism to show

Tip: You may have never considered these questions so take some time to think through <u>your</u> answers before you do this section of the retreat.

- Knowing an event occurred, is different from knowing why an event occurred.
 Understanding why we make certain choices and do certain things gives meaning to our choices and actions
 - Exploring the Question Many folks believe that baptism makes us part of God's family and insures us of God's love and protection. This is not what we believe as Catholics. We believe all human beings are part of God's family and as beloved sons and daughters; everyone is loved unconditionally and forever.

As Catholics we also believe, baptism makes us followers (disciples) of Jesus and members of the Body of Christ, the Church.

This raises important questions for Catholic Christians. <u>Discuss</u> the following questions with your children. Their first response to each question may be "I don't know." They may never have thought about these questions before, so help them think through the questions.

1. If simply being born a human being makes us part of God's family, and God loves all his sons and daughters equally, why do we need to be baptized?

- 2. All people are children of God, but not all people are followers of Jesus. How is a follower of Jesus different from other children of God?
- Parent Faith Sharing Speak from your heart. There are no right or wrong answers. If both parents are present, both should share.

Tell your children why **you choose** to have them baptized? Be as specific and personal as possible. Why was having your child baptized important to **you**?

Tip: Share your response as a story. Use the photos and mementos as you tell them how and why you picked the date, the Church, and maybe even the Priest for their Baptism. How/why did you choose their godparents? What did they wear on that day - was it a family Christening gown or did you buy it just for them? If you can remember, tell them how you felt during the actual baptism (nervous, proud, excited, happy, peaceful...). Share with them what <u>you</u> remember about the Baptism and the celebration you had as part of the day.

Tell them how you felt that night when you put them to bed that night about having had them baptized.

How do you feel now about having made that decision?

Slide 4 – The Gifts we receive in Baptism

The Gifts we receive as Baptized Christians

- > In Baptism the Holy Spirit made us one with Jesus.
- > Because we belong to Jesus, everything about our lives is different.
- > Jesus is with us, everywhere we go and in everything we do.
- ➤ We are connected to everyone and everything through Jesus
- We are set alight with the fire of God's love.

Parent Notes

- Summarize the key points in the slide above.
 - → In Baptism, the Holy Spirit made us one with Jesus. As wonderful as that is it is important to know that the Holy Spirit continues to help us have personal relationship with Jesus, every day of our lives.
 - → Because we belong to Jesus, everything about our lives is brighter, happier, more hopeful... because,

- Jesus is with us everywhere we go and in everything, we do, supporting us, helping us. As a disciple of Jesus we belong to Him, he recognizes us, accepts us, and appreciates us.
- We are connected to everyone and everything through Jesus. We not only belong to Jesus we are a member of The Body of Christ, the Church.
- Others recognize us as the friends of Jesus. They see Jesus in us because of what we say and do. "We will know they are Christians by their love."
